	<p>White Lies: to change or omit a small detail, or lie about a seemingly insignificant issue.</p>	<p>Gossip: to reveal personal or false information about someone.</p>	<p>Defamation: to falsely say something about someone to destroy their reputation.</p>
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Situation	<p>Emily was excited to show her new blouse to Kathy. "It's very pretty," Kathy said, not wanting to make Emily feel bad. But in reality, Kathy didn't like Emily's new blouse.</p>		
	↓	↓	↓
Consequences	<p>Emily will not look pretty wearing the blouse. Kathy will feel bad when she sees Emily wear the blouse and she thinks it looks good. Kathy may also hear negative comments that others make about Emily's blouse.</p>
